# The course and the need

## ▶ IDLTM

- ▶ Since 2001, longest standing, most widely respected language teaching management course.
- ▶ Delivered originally face to face and online, with face to face courses taking place in Australia, Brazil, China, Oman, Spain, Turkey, USA, Vietnam
- ▶ The aim of the International Diploma in Language Teaching Management is to enable experienced professionals in a language teaching context to apply insights and skills derived from management theory and practice to their work as LT managers.

- ▶ Post covid, a need for a fully online course

# What it was

- ▶ One week face to face (approximately 35 hours)
- ▶ 7 months of online work
  - ▶ 8 modules, each with
    - ▶ input (usually articles and other readings)
    - ▶ asynchronous discussion (questions as prompts)
    - ▶ an assignment
    - ▶ Final module involved a group project

# What were the key features of the F2F?

- ▶ Input from an experienced trainer
- ▶ Chance to **R**eflect, in discussion
- ▶ Sharing best **P**ractice
- ▶ Creation of a **C**ommunity
- ▶ **A**pplication of theory to reality

# The new model

- ▶ All online, 8 modules
- ▶ Each module includes
  - ▶ Weekly recorded video input sessions
  - ▶ Weekly one hour live sessions (synchronous)
  - ▶ Other input (usually articles and other readings)
  - ▶ asynchronous discussion (with questions as prompts)
  - ▶ an assignment
  - ▶ Final module still involves a group project

# Intention

- ▶ Video input and live sessions intended to provide a “flipped” version of the previous f2f part of the course
- ▶ Number of hours included is roughly the same as the previous version (20 hours of live sessions, somewhere between 15 and 20 hours of recorded video)
- ▶ Academic rigour unchanged
- ▶ Assessment and other aspects unchanged (though of course the curriculum evolves)

# Reflections

- ▶ Feedback in the first course suggested the desire for more input (in the live sessions) and less sharing
- ▶ NEAS comment: “The new, online format incorporates recorded video input sessions for asynchronous viewing, coupled with live synchronous online sessions using, broadly, a flipped classroom approach in an innovative way to replace the previously face-to-face training room sessions”
- ▶ Still working on inclusion (sharing best practice)
